My dear Doctor Barton;

One of our friends has conferred with me on the subject of the erection of a suitable chapel for the college. I have no definite promise and it is quite likely that nothing positive will be determined for some time yet, but the situation is hopeful. The prospective donor has allowed me to confer with Allen & Collens, architects, 40 Central St., Boston, without committing us in any ways, to see what they would suggest. Mr. Collens has visited Middlebury and looked over the site. He said he would like to confer with some one in Boston who knew about the college and might be able to advise him on some points and I gave him your name and told him I was confident you would be willing to confer with him.

Doubtless you know that their firm erected the Union Seminary buildings in New York, the chapel at Williams, and that they have done a good deal of college and church work. My own idea has been of a building exclusively for religious and other assemblies, i.e., not dramatic. I do not think it would be best to add Y.M.C.A. or club room features, although there might be a choir room and ought to be a minister's room. I have had in mind a structure of the New England meeting house type, and feel that a Gothic cathedral would be quite out of place for us.
